ICC construction begins



WORK has begun on the International Convention Centre (ICC) Sydney.

Construction was announced by NSW Premier Mike Baird (pictured on the left) and Deputy Premier Andrew Stoner (pictured on the

right), as part of the \$2.5b redevelopment of Darling Harbour.

The ICC itself will be built to the tune of \$1b, with the construction project slated to employ 3,700 people and 4,000 at completion.

Baird said once completed the convention, exhibition and entertainment facilities would ensure Sydney remained the first choice in Australia and the Asia Pacific for the "lucrative" business events industry.

Projected to open in 2016, the ICC has already landed 11 events (BEN

Stoner said the redevelopment of Darling Harbour would bring an estimated \$5b in economic benefit over the next 25 years.

"While the revitalisation of Darling Harbour is underway, Sydney will continue to play host to a range of major conventions.

"Up to 20,000 delegates from more than 150 countries will attend the 105th Rotary International Convention which begins this weekend at Sydney Olympic Park."

The Premier and Deputy Premier also announced that a time capsule would be buried on the site with artefacts and information about the area's history.

Exhibition and Events Association

of Australasia (EEAA) ceo Joyce DiMascio said it was good the project was on-time and that preparation of the site for the start of construction was on track.

"There is no doubt business events are on the radar of the NSW

NOVOTEL Sydney Central has completed its refurbishment, including of its main conference centre.

The main conference centre, pre-function area and private bar had been redesigned, with new furnishings, re-painting of fixtures and upgrading of all floor surfaces, the hotel said.

The centre had also upgraded its AV systems and conference rooms would have access to the 'SeeMeNow' tablet interface, which allowed delegates to send through control requests, such as for temperature, to the hotel staff events team, an Accor spokesperson said.

Total refurbishment costs for both phases was about \$8m, the spokesperson said.

The facade of The Star's Astral Tower, The Darling hotel and Sky Terrace rooftop was transformed into a massive light show, developed by Australian company Electric Canvas, which specialises in large-scale projection.
