BestCities SBD Chair

MELBOURNE Convention Bureau General Manager of Business Development and Bids, Beverley Williamson, has been appointed as Chair of the BestCities Global Alliance Strategic Business Development group.

Williamson will replace Dubai Tourism's Karina Lance, who has been the group's Chair since May 2017.

The appointment comes ahead of the fourth annual BestCities Global Forum, which will be held in Copenhagen in Dec.

NT TURBOCHARGED FOR EVENTS

BUSINESS events will generate \$68 million in delegate expenditure in the Northern Territory by 2030, under a new 10-year plan unveiled by the Territory's Government.

Minister for Tourism, Sport and Culture, Lauren Moss (pictured), said the Government will invest close to \$10 million to attract business events through its Turbocharing Tourism and Turbo2 campaigns, as part of its Long-Term Business Events Strategy.

Releasing the Strategy document on Mon, Moss said the sector presented significant benefits for the region.

"On average, business events travellers spend more than other types of visitors, so more business events travellers to the NT means more money in the pockets of Territorians," she said.

"A business event attracting

500 delegates that takes place in the Territory injects more than \$1 million in estimated delegate expenditure.

"Our NT Business Events Support Fund, which is part of Turbocharging Tourism, has so far attracted 45 business events and conferences to the NT, which will bring 13,725 delegates and inject \$32 million in estimated delegate expenditure into our economy.

"The Long-Term Business Events Strategy will enable us to work with key industry stakeholders to focus on identified growth areas and opportunities to secure even more business events for the

Welcoming the new strategy, Darwin Convention Centre General Manager, Peter Savoff, said the events industry had the potential to deliver significant



benefits for the wider community across the Territory.

"The benefits they deliver go beyond hotel rooms and patrons at restaurants," he said.

"Business events leave legacies long after the conference is finished, including up-skilling the local industry, developing new opportunities in the region and enhancing a destination's reputation as a knowledge-based city, to name just a few."

US LEADS THE WAY

THE US is the number one country for international events, the 2018 International Congress and Convention Association (ICCA) Statistics Report reveals.

US hosted 947 major events, 300 more than the second ranked nation, Germany, with Australia hosting the 13th most international meetings (265), attracting 116,000 delegates.

Paris was the world's number one city for hosting international meetings, with more than 212 held in the city, followed by Vienna (172), Madrid (165), Barcelona (163) and Berlin (162), with Sydney Australia's number one city, holding 87, followed by Melbourne (66), Brisbane (33) and Adelaide (13).

Despite hosting 49 fewer events than Paris, Barcelona hosted more participants than any other city (134,838).

In Australia, Sydney held the record for more delegates (48,272), ahead of Melbourne (29,688) and Brisbane (16,383), the ICCA report revealed.

Auckland was the top ranked NZ destination, hosting 39 events and 13,606 delegates.

Bris homecoming for FC Global

BRISBANE has been selected as the host of one of the world's largest travel industry conferences, the Flight Centre Travel Group's (FCTG) Global Gathering in Jul 2020.

Bringing up to 4,500 travel consultants, executives and senior travel industry figures to the City, the event was secured by the Queensland Government through Tourism and Events Queensland and Brisbane City Council through Brisbane Marketing.

Lord Mayor Adrian Schrinner

said the Global Gathering would deliver a seven milliondollar economic boost.

"We're confident that once the world's leading travel professionals experience what Brisbane has to offer, they too will become advocates for our incredible city," he said.

"The Global Gathering is the most important conference on our annual calendar and is a keenly anticipated event for our 20,000 people throughout the world," said FCTG MD Graham Turner.
